

Kerry J. Allen Scholarship

"The Kerry J Allen Scholarship was very helpful in my journey through college. I won the scholarship in 2016 and received the award for four years while I was a student at Alcorn State University, earning my Bachelors in English Literature. The scholarship allowed me to prioritize my studies instead of worrying about finances. I used the scholarship money to furnish my dorm room, buy textbooks, and pay for LSAT prep and testing fees. I maintained a 3.96 GPA while working as Writing Center Consultant and serving as co-founder and president of the Alcorn Pre-Law Society. I was recognized as "Outstanding Graduating Senior" in 2020.

Upon graduation, I accepted a full-ride scholarship to the University of California, Hastings School of the Law. While in law school, I have completed internships doing corporate work for startups and litigation assignments for million-dollar cases involving well-known companies. I also had the pleasure of externing for a judge in the Complex Civil Litigation division of the San Francisco Superior Court. I am now entering my final year of law school.

After law school, I've secured employment with a large, international law firm where I will specialize in intellectual property and startup corporate work. Going forward, I want to pour into Christian students financially, via programs that poured into me, like the Kerry J Allen Scholarship."



s a child growing up, youth ministry was very active and the church was full of youth, however 20+ years later, it's drastically different. It's almost as if youth ministry doesn't exist. What happened? What changed? Why did the young adults walk away from the church at the age of 18? What could we have done differently? Were we relying on the church and the church only to share the gospel? Did we make any changes to retain and re-engage our youth after they turned 18?

One of the reasons our churches are losing the youth is because we are teaching them how to operate within a church setting and not teaching them the full extent of the gospel message. It's great that we are bringing kids to church to share their Easter Sunday speeches, but if that's the focus on why they are coming to church, what is the purpose for the Sunday after that?

Prepare yourself for this next part...The church shouldn't replace what should be planted and nurtured at home. Let's break it down. Your child is in church for one day out of the week and when you break it down further, they are in Sunday school and/or children's church for three hours out of that day. That's three hours out of a 168 hour week. I'm not that good at math, but that seems pretty off. That's not enough time for true growth. We need to change the scales and figure out creative and relevant ways to connect with the youth outside of the four walls. The church shouldn't be the activator of sharing the gospel, but the reinforcer of what is being shared throughout the week with your children.

One of my favorite passages in the Bible is Psalm 34. David speaks on tasting and seeing that the Lord is good but he doesn't stop there. In verse 11, he invites children to come in and learn about God and how to fear the Lord.

Rather than the focus being behavior and etiquette within the church, the focus is to learn and grow in reverence for the Lord. This requires us as Christians to build and share with the younger generation about our God Almighty. This requires discipleship. Discipleship is allowing and inviting others to walk closely with you, while not only teaching them the gospel, but teaching them how to walk the Christian life outside of the four walls of the church.

We're losing the youth to the streets because we are expecting them to walk in the doors of the church. If they won't come to us, let's go to them. Sometimes we need to leave the four walls of the church to reach those that are lost. As Christians, we are not called to live comfortable lives. Let's change the method, not the message.

So you ask, how urgent is it for us to share the gospel to the youth instead of just relying on them to go to church when they are young? EXTREMELY URGENT!!!



Experts who speak on living a life out loud, embracing new identities, and therefore new uncertainties and being bold in the face of the both, proceeding through discomfort and trying on a way of being in this world that while admired, has been foreign and can at times (because of what it requires) can sound less appealing than a root canal yet it's often the path to our dreams.

And hence why many of those dreams lay unfulfilled because as one person recently said, "Sometimes to have the impact you desire, you have to become known." And that can be quite conflicting for those of us who address our fears and discomfort in life by hiding. So trying on this new self, and taking a chance you may have to gain some familiarity in being seen. That being sometimes accomplished by raising your hand and speaking up while for another it may be doing something that you just have never done before and for some just very thought of that may make you recoil.

Often when we avoid doing something to avoid a feeling that action may cause, we deny ourselves of a good feeling on the other side of it and while that's all well and good we also withhold from ourselves something even more important: knowledge!

One of my favorite questions I ask myself when faced with a decision to do something or not in the face of my daunting goals is, "What won't I know if I don't do this? What clarity will I have or encounter that's on the other side of this? Life is about embracing the process, the journey and all of the things you learn and adjust along the way as well as the person you become—a journey that at times can be challenging to take alone.

Because facing fears, "taking chances" etc. is only considered because you're trying to reach a goal.

So, when I was asked to write this article about facing your fears, being bold etc. I knew exactly what I was going to say. Because of my journey, I no longer perceive taking action in my life to become or procure something as taking as chance, making a gamble etc. not knowing where the die may fall, or being fearful of what the outcome may be.

Because if God be for us who can be against us? Because when you understand, as I now do, you're not taking a chance because you know...

- All things work together for the good of those who love the Lord:
- You consider the thought that, even though I didn't know it, it was always going to go happen this way;
- You're figuring out what you want;
- You know you're getting better at feeling your feelings and embracing the uncomfortable ones that you'll encounter along the way;
- You know that you're submitting to the process and the journey of the dream;
- You know that you're living in the present moment and the NOW lies your power to choose;
- You know that you're getting better at making decisions and that includes embracing mistakes, failure and uncertainty.

- You understand the power of your thoughts
- You understand that you're not failing, you're learning.
- You understand that chances are not taking chances but they are you living the life you've been given, pursuing your dreams boldly in the face of fear and you're not afraid to risk it all for a life that brings a smile to your face.

After all, all we have is today. Still nervous? Afraid you'll make the wrong decision in pursuit of this dream? Well, the bible says in Proverbs 3:6, In all thy ways acknowledge him, and he shall direct thy paths. And I would suggest that you do just that. Ask him – and then decide. The district presidents were on board and helped in various ways to make the event happen.

The host for the retreat was the very talented Todd Jenkins of Sweet Rest COCHUSA. Special guests included the National COCHUSA Congress President, Elder Fred Taylor, and four of his children. The speaker for the event was Elder Anthony Miller, from the Southwestern Diocese, who is also the COCHUSA Congress Vice President. He challenged the attendees to improve in various areas of their lives. He reminded the participants that we are fearfully and wonderfully made in the image of God and that we should engage in activities that line up with a faith walk and fill our lives with the things that glorify our Creator.
